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Infant Mortality

- Death of an infant before his or her first birthday
- Infant mortality rate is the number of infant deaths for every 1,000 live births

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Infant Mortality

Leading Causes

- Birth defects
- Preterm birth
- Low birth weight
- Sudden Unexpected Infant Death (SUID)
 - Sudden infant death syndrome (SIDS)
 - Accidental injury (includes sleep related suffocation)
- Maternal pregnancy complications

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Infant Mortality

- In 2016, the infant mortality rate in the United States was 5.9
- For Illinois, the rate was 6.4
- For St. Clair County the rate was 9.3





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St. Clair County Infant Mortality




Number of Infant Deaths in St. Clair County N=158

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


Cause of Death

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Sudden Unexpected Infant Death



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Sudden Unexpected Infant Death (SUID)

<u>Sudden Infant Death Syndrome</u> (SIDS) is the sudden and unexpected death of an apparently healthy infant, under the age of one year, which remains unexplained after a complete medical history review, death scene investigation, and postmortem examination.

Accidental Suffocation & Strangulation in Bed

Suffocation from bedsharing, adult mattresses, soft chairs/couches, sleeping position, pillows, blankets, or toys

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Over 3,600 <u>babies</u> in the U.S. die each year from sleep-related deaths!



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- More than 2,000 infant deaths are preventable
- 1,575 SIDS deaths each year
- 90% of deaths occur before 6 months of age (peak 2-4 months)



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Risk Factors

- No prenatal care
- Low birth weight babies (< 5 lb.)
- Premature babies (< 37 weeks)
- Mothers who smoke during pregnancy (3X greater risk)
- Babies exposed to smoke (2nd & 3rd hand smoke)
- Babies of multiple birth
- Babies born within 18 months of a sibling
- Babies of younger mothers (younger than 18 years)

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- Babies must **<u>ALWAYS</u>** sleep
 - Alone

- Back
- Crib



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A = Alone

- ALWAYS sleeps alone nap time or night time
- Roomshare for 6 months up to 1 year of age
- **NEVER** bedshare with anyone

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B = Back

- □ ALWAYS sleep on their back for nap or night time sleep
- Myth: If baby sleeps on their back their head will get flat and they will lose their hair
- Myth: The baby can choke to death if they spit up while sleeping on their back

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C = Crib

- Approved sleep surfaces: bassinet, portable play yard, or safety approved crib
- Safety approved firm crib mattress, never adult mattress
- **NOTHING** in the crib except the baby!
- Use a sleep sack instead of a blanket; swaddle only until 2 months

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A Collective Impact Approach

Pack N Play

Baby Boxes

- Not recommended by American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) or National Institute of Health (NIH)
- No Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) standards in place

Cardboard box with thin mattress




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D = Don't Overheat

Room temperature at 68-72° F

- 1 layer of clothing more than you have on is enough for the baby
- Use of fan can reduce risk of SIDS by 50%

D = Don't expose to smoke

Baby Safety Classes

Collaboration among community partners to provide education & awareness through the home visiting, case management, WIC programs, and healthcare providers
